

Did you Know?

Last month in July there were <u>**211**</u> missed appointments!!! This is way too <u>**HIGH!!!**</u> and wasted

over <u>**34 hours of</u>** <u>**SURGERY time!!!!**</u> So please, if you cannot attend your clinic appointment then make a cancellation. This then allows others waiting, to utilise the freed up place. Remember appointments can also be cancelled online if you are registered.</u>

NHS HEALTH CHECKS

An NHS Health Check helps to identify potential risks early and by having this check and following the advice of your health professional you improve your chances of living a healthier life.

This check is part of a new national scheme to help prevent the onset of heart disease, strokes, type 2 diabetes and kidney disease.

Everyone between the ages of 40 and 74 who has not been diagnosed with the conditions mentioned is entitled to a free health check every five years. The check is to assess your risk of developing any of the above conditions and they take about 20 to 30 minutes where you will be asked some simple questions about your family history and any medication you are taking, a blood test to check cholesterol levels and your blood pressure.

If you are outside the age range and are concerned about your health, you should contact your GP.

Old Glasses



Please note that you can leave old/unwanted glasses at reception or in the box under the Taxi Freephone. These are collected and given out to charities. A note from the Eastbourne Lions Club about this charity work; "Eastbourne Lions Club has provided a bin for your used spectacles. These are sent on to be sorted, recycled and graded in preparation for use in eye camps in Africa and India. Eastbourne Lions collect and send around 12,000 pairs a year."

Zero Tolerance

This practice supports the Government's NHS Zero Tolerance Campaign. We ask patients to treat GPs, PNs and all practice staff courteously, without a hint of either physical or verbal violence/abuse. Any patient found guilty of such actions will be removed from the surgery

list straight away. Princes Park is a very busy practice and at times the wait to see your GP or PN may be longer than is expected. All the staff are under increasing pressure, with patient expectations at a high, but they are doing their best and just ask for a little patience at times.

If there are no car parking spaces left please do not block the car park area by sitting in your car double parked, or worse just park up blocking in other patients!! This causes problems for the delivery lorries/vans that then have problems with access.

The NHS Friends and Family Test

On 1st December 2014 the NHS Friends and Family Test went live across 8000 GP practices in England. The aim is to drive service improvement in local healthcare by providing patients with the opportunity to give feedback on their experience. For the month of, July, 91.55% of our patients said that they would recommend our surgery to friends and family if they needed similar care or treatment. Thank you for your support.

Sustainability and Transformation Plan

All NHS health organisations and local authority organisations who commission and provide health and care in Sussex and East Surrey have put aside their usual boundaries and come together to work to create an ambitious local plan to achieve a vision of a sustainable health and care system built around the needs of our local populations.

Sussex and East Surrey is one of 44 geographical Sustainability and Transformation Plan (STP) "footprints" in England who have been asked to produce a long-term plan outlining how local health and care services will evolve, improve and continue over the next five years.

Sustainability and Transformation Plan "footprints" are locally defined, based on natural communities, existing working relationships, patient flows and take account of the scale needed to successfully deliver all health and care services.

STP footprints are not statutory bodies, but collective discussion forums which aim to bring together health and care leaders to support the delivery of improved health and care based on the needs of local populations. They do not replace existing local bodies, or change local accountabilities.

Sussex and East Surrey STP chair, Michael Wilson, said: "I am sure we are all aware of the faced in providing excellent health and care services to everyone in our area. I hope what is also clear is the commitment of everyone involved to ensure the improvement and the future of our NHS and social care services.

"Working together as we are now will help build and strengthen local relationships, allow all organisations involved to gain a better understanding of where we are now, our ambition for the future and what we ned to get there.

"As we go on we look forward to engaging with all of our stakeholders in this planning process and I am sure there will be many who will have a lot to say and a lot to contribute."

Practicalities

Sussex and East Surrey has set up an STP with representative from all health and care organisations – NHS trusts (providers), clinical commissioning groups and local councils. In addition, local GPs are involved and Healthwatch is represented and fully embedded in the Programme Board.

Nine working groups have been formed covering: Acute provision (including mental health); workforce; primary and community care provision; digital improvement, estates; provider productivity improvement, communication and engagement and governance are meeting regularly to work through ideas and practicalities.

Working groups and the programme Board have met, together and separately about 11 times since January 2016 and will continue to meet on a regular basis.

Initial presentations to NHS England

The STP Programme Board presented initial ideas to NHS England on 30 June. Download presentation.

Next steps

Initial feedback from NHS England is expected later in the summer. On receipt of that feedback Sussex and East Surrey STP will start to roll out a robust communication and public engagement programme designed to look at options and to gather public opinion. Healthwatch is involved in planning the communication and public engagement programme will also be involved in analysing feedback and preparing a final report on the results of the engagement programme.


